- Friday 27 th, Club Handicap Championship round 5 CC5 set up at 11.00 am with racing underway at 11.45 am.
- Sunday 29 nd, Another general club day with help being offer by senoior members to those who have requested assistance with tuning and help with the rules of sailing from 11.30 am.Scratch racing underway at 12.30pm

Hopefully the Gold Coast weather during the month of May will be more settled and those fresh South to Southeast gusty strong winds and heavy rain squalls will abate so we can not only complete our sailing programme without interuption, we can race in more pleasant conditions.

No2, Special Race event for the month of May,

- On Sunday the 1st and the 29th of May you will see our group is holding help and assistance training prior to our racing on these days. This initiative is designed to help those members who are either new to DF 95 sailing or those who are wanting to improve their sailing performance, with some excellent turison from our senior well experience and knowledgeable skippers. The plan is to have a one on one practical assistance package where help with tuning, rig set up, sail selection, boat maintenance and care, plus some on water practical training learning to pick wind shifts, planning how to get from the start line to top mark arriving preferly on starboard tack so boat contacts are minimised. There is no cost and our plan is to get more skippers on the podium and in the top half of the fleet, which makes for a more enjoyable and satisfing sailing day.
- Sunday the 15 th of May our club is hosting the DF 95 Open invitation one day Regatta and Emerald Lakes on behalf of the QRYA. So far we have 12 entries for this event and I would encorage all of our DF 95 skippers to enter. Which can be easliely done by going to the QRYA website, click Notice of Race and look on the right hand side for the entry details. These events greatly improve your sailing skills and knowledge of yacht racing, plus to get to mix with the classes top skippers which makes for a great, enjoyable day.
- Sunday the 22nd, This is a special one off event for both DF 95s & DF 65s, our DF fleets will compete in the "Back Page Bar long Race" a Handicap race day sailing around Emerald Lakes with 3 windward leeward beats as well as sailing from the Beach starting area, passed the Shed and Jetty around to area 4 where the 10 Raters normally sail, then along the southern and western shores of the lake back to the beach finishing marks, Please see the course map below



Race Day Programme

- 1, Set up to race will be at 11.00 am, with the start and finish in area 1 the beach. Racing will commence at 12.15 pm.
- **2**, The race will be held for all **DF yachts**, **65s & 95s** all of whom are welcome to enter, the **race fee will be \$10 per boat**. All boats will sail together over the same course concurrently with Handicap Le mans start from the stone wall at the beach.
- **3**, The course will consist of three single windward leeward one laps, the first off, the beach, the second around at area 4 where the 10 Raters normally sail and third lap will be out from the club jetty where the IOMs sail. **The finish will be too windward between a red and green marks adjacency to the beach depending upon the wind direction on the day.**
- **4,** It is estimated again depending upon wind strength the race should be completed with 1.25 to 1.5 hours (approx. 1.15 to 1.45 pm) after cleaning up returning all equipment to the shed, a **BBQ lunch and event prize giving will commence at the Back Page Bar from 2.30 pm until 4.00 pm**. A perpetual trophy has been made available for this event to be raced for annually.
- **5,** As this is a major club members race we are looking for additional people to help us run this event, we need people to monitor the boats from the shore as they sail around the course we need people to assist with the beach starts and record the finishing of all boats. Wives and Partners are all welcome and can attend the after match function, BBQ & Prize giving at the Back Page Bar once the racing concludes.

The interest from skippers to partisipate in this race has been great, we should have at least 25 to 30 boats and hopefully the weather will be cooperative to us. It also will give all skippers some great walking excerise as they follow their boats around the northern side of the lake.

No3, Members Profile,

Our next Club Member of our group to feature in our members profile is Will Charton sail No 48 a long time Radio sailer who with his wive Wendy, divides his life style and sailing between Melbourne and the Gold Coast sailing his DF 95, DF 65 and his IOM at Paradise here on the Coast from May until September and Lilydale in Melbourne for the balance of the year.

In recent times Will has also accepted a number of administive roles in our sport, he has had a lot to do with the formation of the Australian DF Sailing Association, have been the registrar issuing sail numbers and now the Secretary, He is an avid supporter of Radio Sailing not only as a sport but as a therapeutic support to those people with physical disablities and





those younger people who want to learn to sail where the cost to partisipate is affordable to all peoples budgets.

WILL CHARLTON was Brisbane born as a younger member of the Silent Generation just before the Post War baby boomers. He was a competitive but shy lad who could not play ball sports, nor run very fast, and grew up with metal splints. Even so, his competitive spirit was strong, and he excelled at rowing, winning Best Oarsman of the year as schoolboy.

Will was asked for his sailing experience's and a little about Will that is relevant to sailing an about and some past personal history... So here it is!

On sailing my first experience was with the U of Q Sailing club who sailed out of the UQ Rowing Club where I store my rowing scull. The University Sailing Club had a few lightweight sharpies. No experience at all, I was thrown on to the trapeze, bear footed (Mistake) sailing at Lake Cootharaba, near Noosa in my first regatta as a newbie, I was told to wear a heavy woollen jumper and then promptly was ducked in the water by the skipper. why? Was all wet and cold told me he wanted me heavier as the wind was up. Oh, did I suffer bare feet on the gunnel in the first race, put on my sneakers after that. came second last for the regatta I recall. Even so it was an exciting fun weekend with my new mates.

I was hooked on sailing till I discovered /started motor sport, circuit racing at many of the circuits on the east coast of Australia with Shell sponsorship, culminating in 1970 wining the Qld Sportscar championship and the Australian Hillclimb Championships for my Class at Mt Cotton Hillclimb. near Redland Bay. President of the Car Club I knew every bump in that Hillclimb as I



When posted overseas in Hong Kong, the mid 1970's, I crewed on a J24 with the owner JB Wong who was always skipper, it was fun and he was good company in an interesting region /county. On a round the island race as a sheet hand I failed to respond in time and we broached in a big sea – I broke two ribs, so we retired from that race finding sailing can be dangerous!

Currently, I am Secretary of the Australia DF Radio Sailing Assoc (ADFRSA Inc.)

Will has always been able to start well in our club scratch racing, even as a seated sailor.

Started off as a founding member of the DF 95 fleet at PRYC and donate a MUG as a perpetual trophy (no condition on how to be awarded)

Still having FUN sailing my three radio-controlled boats (IOM – a Plan B, DF 95s and DF65's) and is active in promoting fairness equality, non-discriminatory behaviour, transparency, member protection and risk management in sailing clubs.

He is as are others with any disabilities very sensitive to discrimination and he will call it out. He particularly wants to see his boat at all times within a distance that the sail numbers are easily recognisable by normal vision sailors. that is fair and within the existing sailing rules - in his opinion.



Finally, yes, I am disabled due to age (Peripheral neuropathy /ataxia) as well as nerve pain I suffer from chronic arthritic pain; cannot balance, nor walk far as we all can be at any stage in our life. May I reach out to ALL involved in Radio sailing to think about that.

Becoming disabled is tough mentally and can happen to all of us at any age. Yes, I have fortunately had great mental support from my new friends via radio sailing across Australia.

Will used to say "Don't tell me I can't do that"; now he says "Do it today"

That all folks, see you on the water, having fun!

No 4, DF 95 Hull Reinforcement rules

Several Members have asked about the legalities of reinforcing new hulls before any damage occurs and if these treated boats can enter state and National regattas here in Australia. I have asked the current President of the DF Association Phil Burgess for his comments and the official ruling that may apply to this question,

The official rules that DF boats sail under state it is illegal to prereinforce a new DF hull if it has not sustained any hull damage, if you wish to race in a State or National event.

However, if your boat has developed hull damage such as hull cracking you are able to reinforce the damaged area either in the hull interior or by Appling self-adhesive film over the exterior of the hull, and race in State or National events.

The DF International Class Rules committee have been asked to reword/clarify the current rule book wording to make the answer to this question clear and more concise. Their response should be available within a few months.
